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

As global perspective is one of Bryant's strategic pillars, the Division of International Affairs makes great efforts to ensure that our students develop

an appreciation of the interconnectedness of cultures and economies, so they are fully prepared to make a difference in an age of unlimited global opportunities. That translates into two efforts: To send our students out into the world and to bring the world to the Bryant campus. Global Vision Realized With Historic First Commencement At Bryant Zhuhai

On June 8, 2019 in Zhuhai, China, Bryant University President **Ronald K. Machtley** awarded Bryant Zhuhai's first graduating Class of 2019, 130 students, with a Bryant Bachelor of Science in Business degree with a major in Accounting. Peking University President **Hao Ping, Ph.D.**, was awarded a Bryant honorary degree. President Machtley and Beijing University of Technology Board of Trustees Chairman **Taoguang "TG" Wang '16H, Ph.D.**, addressed the graduates and distinguished guests. **Louis Page**, a Bryant University Trustee founding Academic Dean at Bryant Zhuhai **David Lux, Ph.D.**, and Bryant University Vice President for International Affairs **Hong Yang, Ph.D.** attended the commencement.

The milestone commencement is the culmination of more than a decade of strategic efforts by Bryant University and

field, RI, campus and Bryant Zhuhai, located in Guangdong Province. This fall, 35 students will transfer as juniors to Bryant University in Smithfield to complete their degree requirements in the U.S.A.

Bryant Zhuhai was approved by the Chinese Ministry of Education in March 2015 and welcomed its first class of Chinese students in September 2015. The students of Bryant Zhuhai's first class were selected from among the top 20 percent of all Chinese students taking the Chinese college entrance exam (Gaokao). The academic program for American and Chinese students is taught in English and mirrors Bryant's nationally recognized curriculum vigor and quality of faculty. Bryant Zhuhai graduates are prepared with the global perspective that is essential for success in today's international business environment.

make a commitment to not only continue but expand these exchange programs. Bryant Zhuhai is a model of how an inter-institutional education can be achieved."

China has long been a cornerstone of Bryant University's international strategy, and since 2005, Bryant has advanced innovative education initiatives between China and the United States. Bryant is the first American university to establish a presence in Zhuhai, the first university to form a partnership with a private institution in China, and offers the only U.S.-China joint four-year undergraduate business degree program in China.

"It is an honor to be a part of Bryant's global community of scholars. I am impressed by the commitment, hard work, and accomplishments of our graduates," said Bryant Zhuhai Academic Dean **Daniel Borgia, Ph.D.**

Wang expressed his appreciation for the collaboration and believes that the joint program has integrated the Chinese traditions of dedication, focus, and hard work with American academic freedom, equality, and collaboration and provides students with a broader international perspective and brighter career.

About 70 percent of the new graduates have already been accepted to graduate schools around the world, with 19 enrolled in the Master of Professional Accountancy (MPAc) program at Bryant's Smithfield campus. Others have secured employment with prominent companies and organizations in China and Hong Kong such as Ernst & Young, KPMG, Bank of China, and China Agriculture Bank. They join a powerful global network of more than 50,000 accomplished Bryant alumni around the world who are making a difference in their organizations and their communities.

Sophomores take first SIE Japan trip

Through Bryant's signature Sophomore International Experience (SIE), 19 students explored Japanese business and culture, expanding their global perspective and gaining important insights into the workings of an increasingly inter-connected world. A trip to Japan, the first visit in SIE history, brought their studies to life.

"This was not just a course, or just a trip, it was truly a profound international experience," says **Associate Professor of Economics Aziz Berdiev, Ph.D.**, who helped teach the SIE course and led the students to Japan.

A three-credit course, SIE caps a semester of intensive introduction to another country with a two-week international trip led by faculty and staff, during which students immerse themselves in the cul-

ture and learn how businesses operate globally. Students often describe their trip as a defining moment of their college career.

"It's more than learning about Japanese business and culture," says **Kaoru Paganelli, Assistant Director, Office of International Students and Scholars**. "It offers an opportunity for students to develop cultural competence while thinking critically to understand a very different culture."

For this year's SIE Japan participants, the experience began long before the students touched down in Tokyo. The months-long preparation process provided students with a primer on a broad range of topics from culture to politics to language to economics. "We want our students to truly immerse

themselves," explains Berdiev, who has previously led SIE trips to Malaysia, London, Argentina, and Chile. "And to do that, they need to be prepared."

Over the course of the 11 days, the troupe visited a wide range of sites of cultural, historical and political importance. Trips to traditional locations such as the Meiji Shrine, Himeji Castle, and the Tenryuji Temple were complemented with expeditions to places such as the Odaiba district, home to Fuji Television Studios and the National Museum of Emerging Science and Innovation.

"One of the things that made this trip so unique was the amount of thought that went into the planning," says **Matthew Mays '21**, who notes the research the students did helped them better understand their journey.

Since Bryant Zhuhai opened in 2015, nearly 100 students have transferred from China to Smithfield. In May, **Ying Wang '19** was among the first group of Bryant Zhuhai students who have studied for two years on each campus to graduate from Bryant.

"I wake up every day and think how amazing it is that I get the chance to do things that I would have no opportunity to do in traditional Chinese schools, like

taking courses in design thinking," said Wang. Experiences that enhanced her teamwork and communication skills "were very valuable," the Accounting and Economics major noted.

As a Bryant Zhuhai sophomore, Wang traveled to Smithfield through the Sophomore International Experience program. It was her first trip to the United States, and she fell in love with the Bryant community. "It was so beautiful and you could feel the atmosphere of being in a home," she says.

Her transition as a transfer student to Bryant was smooth thanks to University

resources such as the Academic Center for Excellence (ACE) and the U.S.-China Institute.

"The peer tutors at ACE are willing to provide any help and any advice they can to support international students when they first come to campus," she said. "The U.S.-China Institute also makes sure to celebrate our own festivals and events on campus, which really makes it feel like home."

Wang will stay at Bryant to study toward her Master of Professional Accountancy.



Exploring Foreign Service Careers

Faculty Spotlight on Global Perspective: Professor A.Can Inci

Finance Professor **A. Can Inci, Ph.D.** exemplifies the global perspectives Bryant faculty bring to their teaching and research. Born and raised in Turkey, in addition to Turkish he speaks fluent English and German and can converse in Spanish and French. He has visited more than 40 countries across the globe and has traveled to all 50 states.

Professor Inci earned an undergraduate degree in Electrical and Electronics Engineering from Bogazici University in Istanbul. After a fellowship from the British Council, he received a master's degree in Control Systems from the Imperial College at the University of London. A full scholarship from Ohio State University allowed him to pursue an MBA, followed by a Ph.D. in Finance from the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor. Over the course of his teaching career, Dr. Inci has developed and taught courses at both the undergraduate and graduate levels during his ten years at the University including International Finance, Innovations in Contemporary Finance, and Foundations of Financial Theory.

Students taking his classes Dr. Inci says, “can expect to broaden their horizons and gain experience with many relevant high-tech financial and international models.” He advises incoming students to “anticipate to study a lot, absorb as much useful information as possible in this ever-changing world, and use their time wisely and productively.”

Dr. Inci also has wide ranging experience as a higher education consultant with extensive knowledge about the AACSB (Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business) accreditation process for business schools in the U.S. He has worked with numerous quality assurance agencies including the NECHE (New England Commission of Higher Education) and EQUIS (European Foundation for Management Development Quality Improvement System). He has also published widely on financial topics and has been honored with numerous awards and grants during his career.

Support for International Students Continues to Expand

As Bryant's international student population grows, the services and programs offered to this diverse group of students is expanding and evolving to meet increasing demands. During the spring semester, a number of programs geared toward student success and creating greater awareness among the Bryant community were held.

What Every International Student Should Know About U.S. Employment – This informative program, organized by the Office of International Students and Scholars, featured speaker **Dan Beaudry**, former head of cam-

pus recruiting at Monster.com. Beaudry shared insight into his proven job search strategy and provided advice to help international students successfully find U.S. employment, and obtain a H-1B sponsorship.

International Career Fairs – Two career fairs focused on Africa and Europe were held in the Boston area for interested Bryant students.

More than 20 companies participated in the career fair of the African Business Conference held at Harvard Business School. Students had the opportunity to network with

representatives of the companies, many of which were offering full-time internship opportunities.

Bryant students also attended the European Career Fair held at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, the largest of its kind in the United States with more than 90 participating organizations and employers ranging from multinational corporations to nonprofit organizations.

“Bryant University offers international employers entry-level talent that is exceptionally well prepared for international

“It is important for the Bryant community to hear these students' experiences because we learn firsthand from the students how the programs and services we provide actually meet their needs and help them academically and culturally,” said Associate Director of the U.S.-China Institute **Kongli Liu, M.Ed.** “Their experience is also part of the larger experience of our international student

population. The more we hear from students, the better job we can do to make Bryant a welcoming and nurturing global learning environment for all students, domestic and international.”

My Sophomore International Experience (SIE) in China was amazing. I am thankful that I was given the opportunity to travel with bright, caring, and adventurous individuals from Bryant. We traveled to so many unique cities and I stepped out of my comfort zone.

Beijing was our first stop. We started our trip by visiting the Forbidden City, where I was taken aback by the Imperial Garden. World Trade Day Discusses U.S. – China Relations And Honors Late Founder

Bryant University's 34th Annual World Trade Day – Global Trends: Opportunities and Strategies on May 22 drew more than 500 business leaders. World Trade Day is one of the region's largest international business conferences.

During her keynote address, **Amy Celico**, Principal at Albright Stonebridge Group, a global business strategy firm based in Washington D.C., spoke about the rising tensions between the U.S. and China and shared informed insights about the views held in both Washington and Beijing.

"Tensions are high, they're rising and there is no end in sight," she told the crowd before laying out what factors she sees as driving the actions of the two countries.

Presented by the University's John H. Chafee Center for International Business, World Trade Day 2019 addressed some of the pressing issues impacting local companies, with a focus on sharing best practices, highlighting opportunities, and exploring options. The day featured more than 40 speakers and include topics such as emerging markets, specific country highlights, trade policy

updates, managing global supply chains, strategies for importers, cyber security, and more.

World Trade Day 2019 also honored the legacy of Chafee Center Director **Raymond Fogarty '79**, who passed away unexpectedly in September 2018. Fogarty founded World Trade Day in 1985, recognizing the need for an event that would bring together business, academic, and government leaders to share strategies and opportunities for growth. This year, **John Hazen White, Jr.**, president of TACO, Inc., presented a posthumous Lifetime Achievement Award to Fogarty in honor of his outstanding contributions promoting international trade and collaboration.

For MBA students, study trip to Germany offered exclusive look at innovation at Audi

Bryant MBA students experienced "unprecedented" access to some of the world's top companies during their transformational Global Immersion Experience (GIE) trip to Germany in January.

"This trip has taught me how crucial it is for companies to be agile and innovative in order to succeed and maintain their success in today's competitive environment," said **Rachita Wadhwa '19MBA**.

"The fact that every single participant had to sign a full confidentiality agreement is a testament to how deep we were allowed into Audi's business."

GIE is a three-credit course that introduces students to the economic opportunities and challenges of doing business in a globalized world. It also includes a 10-day international trip. A required group project with businesses in the trip's destination country

builds on core constructs of the students' first semester of academic study.

One of those businesses was Audi. At the company's headquarters in Ingolstadt, Bryant MBA students were treated to an exclusive customized tour. "This was an unprecedented once-in-a-lifetime opportunity," said Assistant Professor of Management **Dirk Primus, Ph.D.**

Students walked among 45,000 Audi employees to learn first-hand what it means to create "competitive advantage via technology." They saw highly advanced testing rigs and simulators for Audi's proprietary technology, and sat in prototypes that will be released to market in 2020 and later. Some students enjoyed a test drive with a professional Audi driver. The remarkable tour was made possible by Ronny Mueller, an executive in Audi's product technology department.

In addition to Audi, students also learned about the intricacies of pen fabrication at Faber Castel, and the process of manufacturing airplanes at Lufthansa.

"Students saw first-hand the serious German work ethic, innovation and intense focus," said Professor of Management **John Visich, Ph.D.**, who traveled with the students as faculty instructor for the course.

Bryant Leadership Featured at Annual AIEA Conference

There were more than 100 sessions and roundtable discussions that provided opportunities for international education leaders to engage in peer-learning about relevant and key issues for the field.

Spotlight on AIEA Opportunities: The Presidential Fellows and Senior Advisers Programs – As chair of the Senior Advisers Program, Yang introduced both programs and discussed opportunities for future participation.

Navigating the Controversy around Confucius Institutes in US Higher Education – Yang shared his experience and perspectives about how to interpret the current issues surrounding Confucius Institutes and discussed the institute's important role in Bryant's global strategy.

From Faculty to SIO: Bridging the Gaps in Knowledge, Skill, and Understanding – Yang chaired the session that helped attendees better understand the expectations, management requirements, and necessary skills that will help them navigate the transition to a career as a successful senior international officer.

7-Minute Motivators: Innovations in Global Partnership Building – Yang introduced attendees to Bryant University and Bryant Zhuhai.

As an AIEA Presidential Fellow, Yang currently serves as a member of AIEA's Leadership Development Committee, in which he is involved in establishing the "Standards of Professional Practice for International Educators" worldwide. He also co-chairs the AIEA's Senior Advisors Program that Provides mentorship opportunities by creating cohorts of new international administrators with experienced senior advisors.

Providence Celebrates Asian Pacific Heritage Month

Providence, RI Mayor Jorge Elorza announced that the city will officially celebrate Asian Pacific Heritage Month each May. The mayor was joined by Vice President for International Affairs **Hong Yang, Ph.D.**, and other community partners in honoring the contributions and legacies of

the Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders to their local communities.

Yang highlighted the contributions of these communities saying, "From arts to gourmet food, from music to sports, and from science to technology, Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders of all ages, inspired by their

traditions, heritage, and identity, have enriched American history, and will undoubtedly shape its future."

Yang emphasized the important role that Bryant and the City of Providence have played in strengthening the bonds that tie these communities together. He discussed the University's commitment to China and thanked Mayor Elorza for his leadership in establishing a sister city relationship between Providence and Zhuhai, China.

"I came to America more than 30 years ago as a student," Yang said.
